Tonv's Tip 1

A tip I read recently came under the heading "Stop Doing This". You hold this type of hand:

S A7

H KQ1084

D J8

C QJ87

You open 1H and partner responds 1S. Our usual habit is to bid the 4 carded club suit. The recommended bid is 1NT. The hand is semi flat with an ordinary 13 point count. Which bid best describes the hand, 1NT or 2C? If partner has a minimum, 6 to 10 points, it is better to play at the one level. If you bid 2C, semiforcing, and partner has no fit, the contract is likely to be played in 2NT. A level you may wish to avoid. Maybe we don't have diamonds stopped, so let the opponents win a few diamonds. You are only at the one level rather than being in 2NT without a D stopper.

Better still, if you want to play more hands be the first to bid NT.

More on opening leads.

An old tip comes to mind:

If long in the opponents trump suit, 4 or more, lead from a long suit. Your objective is to eventually force declarer to trump from his long suit. You may gain trump control or make life more difficult for him.

If short in the opponents trump suit, lead from a short suit, 1 or 2. You're hoping to gain a ruff.

Tony's Tip 2 PLAY OF THE HAND

Experts say the importance of bidding is 60% of the game and play 40%. However most will agree that the play is more fun, more so if a clever play gains you an extra trick on the field.

Loser on Loser play: when not to ruff.

Like most special plays it requires a little preplanning: firstly to recognise it and then the execution. There are various situations where it is advantageous not to ruff. The following 3 are probably the most common.

- If ruffing will shorten your trump suit and may cause you to lose trump control.
- 2. You may get an extra trick if you refuse to trump.
- 3. If you are in danger of being **over** ruffed.

1. Not losing trump control.

Declarer	Dummy	
D KQJ4	10 9 5	
SAK6	973	
H 8 2	9 5 4	
C Q 8 7 2	K J 10 3	

Declarer is playing in 1D. N leads the heart A, then K and Q. If trumps break 4-2, which is most likely (an even number, they are odds on to break unevenly), you will lose trump control and never be able to set up winners in the club suit.

A loser on loser play is therefore required, so discard S6 on the third heart. If hearts are continued, ruff with the H10 in dummy.

2. You may get an extra trick if you refuse to trump.

Declarer	Dummy
S KQJ94	A102
H 10	Q743
D AQ74	KJ2
C 872	A63

Declarer is in 4S against a small H led by N, won by the K, and a small H is returned. What do you do? If you ruff you gain nothing as N will play low (ruffing in the long suit hand doesn't gain, only the short trump suit adds trump tricks). Instead play a low club. North must win with the K and your HQ becomes a winner to discard your other losing club. You will always have 10 tricks, but this play make 11, a winning board in duplicate competition.

3. Avoid being over ruffed.

4.	Declarer	Dummy
	H AKQJ73	642
	S 1063	97
	D A94	KJ2
	C 6	AJ854

North leads SA then the SK, his partner signalling a doubleton (playing high low, 8 then the 2).

At trick 3 North leads the SQ. What do you play from dummy? With only small trumps in dummy, South is bound to over ruff. You have a probable losing

Diamond if the finesse of the Q fails. Therefore avoid trumping and instead discard a small Diamond from dummy. If Hearts are continued you can ruff high in your own hand. Then draw 2 rounds of trumps and ruff your third Diamond in dummy after playing the K followed by the A.
